It is no secret that November is one of our busiest months in the year with the four showtime performances of our fall musical. This year, we presented Disney's "High School Musical" which was attended by over 1300 people over the four days. The performances were met with rave reviews with many people commenting that they cannot believe this was a high school production. The musical has been a CCS tradition since 1997. This year, we had 55 kids from grades 4-12, 8 staff, and 38 other volunteers involved in making this show happen.
